In fact, growing and nurturing local talent for the performing arts, scripting, directing and staging is as important to them as is the resounding applause at the end of a production.

Gallery Theater of West Chicago was established as a volunteer organization in the fall of 2009, and leased part of the basement of the 200 Main Street building during its early years. With an entrance on Turner Court, the tiny space had limited seating, and quick sell-out performances meant some were left disappointed.

Today, Gallery Theater is part of a West Chicago not-for-profit arts organization, People Made Visible, and functions under its 501 (c) 3 status. The seven-member Theater Board includes **Gail Cannata** (West Chicago), **Patti Kozlowski** (Batavia), **Carolyn Larsen** (Wheaton), **Rich Nagel** (West Chicago), **Howard Raik** (Oak Park), **Tom Tawney** (West Chicago), and **Carol Townsend** (West Chicago). Since March of 2017, Gallery Theater moved to its current location at 129 Main Street across from the iconic City fountain. The current venue is air conditioned and has comfortable seating for 35.

Small in size but large in providing a creative outlet for both actor and audience, the Theater produces five plays a season from September through early June, choosing both drama and comedies. It includes well known plays and original works. Open auditions give anyone interested in performing a welcome opportunity to do so, and has rewarded the Theater with talented actors from all corners of the Chicago Metro, providing fresh and enthusiastic performances for each of its productions. Four West Chicago residents have been cast in the upcoming show, *The Dining Room*, by A.R. Gurney, directed by Tom Rieser. They are Maureen Navadomskis, Carol Townsend, Mark Fortman and Thomas Tawney. Additional performers in the cast of ten come from Maywood, Downers Grove, Chicago, Winfield, Maple Park, and Palatine.

Performances are scheduled for April 5, 6, 7 and 12, 13, 14, 2019. Tickets may be purchased in advance at www.gallerystudio.com, by contacting gallerytickets@gmail.com, or by calling (630) 234-5919.

The final offering for the Theater's 9th season will be, *Suite Surrender* by Michael McKeever, directed by Gail Cannata. Performances are scheduled for May 31, 2019, June 1, 2 and 7, 8, 9, 2019. Currently, the play reading committee is busy reading scripts for Gallery Theater's 10th season line-up. Volunteers are needed in many capacities whether on stage or behind the scenes. The list of rewarding opportunities is long.

Gallery Theater provides a wonderful entertainment option for those who prefer an evening of live theater close to home, an affordable ticket price, and a chance to enjoy the ancient art of storytelling through the performances of those who live in and around the immediate community.

FROM THE

Mayor

This January, City staff hosted the first class of the West Chicago Local Government Academy (LGA). A total of nine participants attended the weekly classes held in the City Council Chambers. The participant pool ranged from students in the 6th grade to freshmen in college. For some, this was their first visit to City Hall, but all decided to participate in the program because they wanted learn about their community, City government, and how to get more involved.

The eight-week course has thus far introduced students to the history, origins and types of local government; the history of West Chicago; and the role of the City Manager/Administrator, the City Council, and the Administrative Services Department.

Students were quickly introduced to the challenges facing many local communities in Illinois due to the financial crisis at the State level. They participated in a budget activity to cut services or increase taxes/fees to fill a \$100,000 revenue shortfall - a scenario that has become all too familiar for government agencies, including West Chicago.

During the sessions, students were asked to reflect on questions such as:

- How do you define community?
- Is community important to you?
- What is the responsibility of an individual to a community?

The overall theme of their responses was that people need to come together to improve the lives of others. This is such an inspiring message from our future leaders.

The purpose of the LGA and programs such as this one is to bring the community closer together — to learn *about* and *from* each other in order to create and build relationships so that when we face new challenges we will be ready to find common solutions together.

The LGA supports the vision of **One West Chicago**, a priority of the West Chicago Strategic Plan, to establish long-term relationships through engagement



efforts and to encourage broader participation in community leadership opportunities.

Brush Pickup – Brush should not be placed at the curb any sooner than the weekend prior to the monthly pickup. Brush pickup does not begin until the first full week of the month. Note that you could be issued a \$50.00 fine for placing brush at the curb too early.

Tall Grass and Weeds – Whether you own your home or rent, please help keep your grass trimmed to a height of less than eight inches. Dandelions grow very quickly this time of year and more frequent cuttings might be necessary. Also, if you are out of town for an extended period, please make arrangements to have your grass cut in your absence. Finally, if you do receive a Notice of Ordinance Violation for tall grass and/or weeds, please mow your grass within seven days to prevent further enforcement action, such as fines. Contact the Community Development Department at (630) 293-2200, x 141 if any extenuating circumstances exist.

Driveway Improvements or Modifications – Keep in mind that a building permit is always required for any driveway work (with the exception of maintenance sealing of an asphalt driveway), whether it's paving, concrete or interlocking pavers. Before you apply for your permit, track down a copy of your property's plat of survey and make a copy for the City. The permit application fee is \$80 and will be reviewed within three to five business days. City inspectors will need to see the layout before work starts and to approve once the work is completed. Work in the right-of-way (the area between the sidewalk and the street) may require a cash bond. The amount will depend on the work's impact to the street. The bond amount will be returned once work is completed and approved. Call the Community Development Department at (630) 293-2200, x141 with questions or for clarification.

takes place. This training and the information provided have become the preferred response, versus the traditional lockdown approach. The training takes place on Saturday, April 13, 2019 from 10:00 a.m. – 12:00 p.m. at the West Chicago Firefighter Training Academy located at 320 Kress Road.
